The Summer Show at Benhill Allotment Site, Sunday 7th July 2024

- 2. 9 stems of sweet peas
- 3. 6 beans (French), with stalks
- 4. 9 beans (runner), with stalks
- 5. 3 beetroots, one variety, with at least 7.5cm tops
- 6. 1 cabbage, with at least 7.5cm stalk
- 7. 3 carrots, with at least 7.5cm tops
- 8. 3 courgettes, between 13cm 20cm long (length requirement excluding round varieties)
- 9. 1 cucumber
- 10. 3 garlic bulbs
- 11. 2 lettuces, with roots
- 12. 6 mangetout peas, with stalks
- 13. 6 pods of peas, with stalks
- 14. 1 marrow, not to exceed 45cm in length
- 15. 5 onions (autumn sown), as grown (not tied or trimmed)
- 16. 10 onions (salad)
- 17. 5 potatoes, any variety
- 18. 10 radishes
- 19. 10 spinach / beet / chard leaves
- 20. 3 sticks of rhubarb, no leaves, with 7.5cm tops
- 21. any other vegetable not mentioned above
- 22. 10 strawberries with stalks (one dish)
- 23. 10 raspberries with stalks (one dish)
- 24. 10 blackberries with stalks (one dish)
- 25. 10 gooseberries with stalks (one dish)
- 26. any other soft fruit
- 27. "Beet It" competition (Beetroot seed supplied for small fee see over for rules)

Junior Section - Up to 12 Years of Age on 1st Jan 2024

- 28. a grown vegetable
- 29. a miniature garden made from grown material
- 30. an arrangement of wild flowers or leaves

Spud-in-a-Tub' Competition – Open to all members

Each entry will be laid out on a tray, noting weight and number of potatoes.

The "Gordon Bennett" Trophy is awarded to the grower of the greatest total weight of potatoes grown from a single seed potato along with a BCHS voucher for £10. The smallest entry will win the 'Tryarda Trophy'.

'Spud' Rules

- A different variety of seed potato is selected by the show committee each year.
- Members can purchase as many entries as they wish from the Trading Hut from January.
- All potatoes must be grown from the seed potato provided. (Potatoes grown from other varieties will be disqualified) in the plastic poly bag provided.
- Growers can choose the growing medium and method
- All entries must be brought to the weigh-in still in the poly bag as grown. (Tops can be removed.)
- We will dispose of any entries not collected at the end of the event.

'Beet It' Competition – Open to all members

'Beet It' Rules

- Members can purchase as many entries as they wish from the Trading Hut from February entries will be a quantity of seeds of a beetroot variety in a paper envelope
- All beetroots entered must be grown from the seeds
- Growers can choose the growing medium and method
- Showing, display up to three of your best beetroot, show as dug but clean the beetroot there will be a section in the show please ask the Show Committee members with any questions
- A £10 BCHS voucher will be awarded to the grower of the best beetroots and £5 to the runner up
- This is a fun competition, please enter what you have grown!
- We will dispose of any entries not collected at the end of the event

Best Allotment Competition

• Judging for these awards takes place in the summer.

Trophies are awarded for the following:

- a) best lady allotment holder
- b) best novice plot
- c) best 125 m2 allotment
- d) best 250 m2 allotment

Showing Rules

1. The Schedule:

Please read this schedule carefully, including the rules, and refer any queries you may have to the Show Secretary, Graham Cockram at <u>gc 139@hotmail.com</u>

- The judge's decision is final in all cases.
- Judging is to be in accordance with National Vegetable Society rules, where appropriate.

2. Who can enter?

- Exhibitors for either Show must be members of the Benhill-Crescent Horticultural Society.
- Two or more people may not compete separately in the same class with exhibits from the same garden and/or allotment.
- Exhibitors must have grown plant exhibits for at least 3 months prior to the Show.
- Children may enter exhibits for the Junior Sections, for free.
- A novice is a person who has not won a first prize at any show in the specified section in which he/she is exhibiting. Prizes awarded in novice sections will not count towards trophies.

3. Place, dates and times:

- Both the Summer Show on Sunday July 7th and the Autumn Show on Sunday September 1st are held at the Allotment Site in Benhill Road.
- Staging is from 9.00 -11.30am on the day of the show (judging starts at 12 noon). Exhibitors are asked to leave the Show Area by 11.30am to give the stewards an opportunity to check exhibits before judging.
- The Autumn Show is open in the afternoon to the public at 2.00pm.
- Awards will be presented at approximately 12.30pm at the Summer Show and approximately 4.00pm at the Autumn Show. Exhibits must remain staged until this time.
- Please use the loose entry forms included with this Schedule to submit your entries and note the dates and times, **especially the deadline date and time**. Late entries will be charged double.
- Please be considerate when parking to unload exhibits. Trolleys are available to help avoid numerous trips to and from your vehicle.

4. The number of specimens required:

Please pay particular attention to the number and sizes (if given) of specimens required in the Schedule, as an exhibit that consists of more or less will be disqualified and labelled 'NAS', (Not According to Schedule).

5. Presentation of produce:

- All exhibits should be staged as attractively as possible with consideration given to 'condition' and 'uniformity'. An exhibit is 'uniform' when the items of which it consists are alike in age, size and form.
- An exhibit in good condition should be fresh, clean and free from blemishes and diseases.
- All exhibits should be clean and the outside of any pots should be washed.
- The natural bloom on fruit enhances its' appearance.
- Soft fruit should be shown on the stalk.
- All vegetables should be properly prepared for exhibition, with roots washed.
- It is customary to display certain items on a plate, eg. tomatoes. Plates are provided.
- Sand can be used to display.
- Carrots, beetroots, parsnips, rhubarb etc must have the leaves removed, leaving at least 7.5cm tops.
- Onions and shallots should be tied with raffia (unless otherwise stated).
- Vases are provided by the Society for all classes except those in which 'any container' or 'bowl' may be used.
- A 'dish' in the schedule refers to a specified quantity of a fruit or vegetable, which may be displayed on a table or on a receptacle of any shape.
- 6. Prize Money: Entry fees: All Classes / 20p per entry
- Junior Classes Free 1st - £2.00 2nd - £1.00 3rd - 50p will be presented at approximately 12.30pm at the Summer Show and approximately 4.00 pm at the Autumn Show.

All adult classes will be paid in BCHS Vouchers.

Some awards are given according to points received:

- 1st 6 points 2nd 3 points 3rd 2 points
- The person with the most points in the Summer Show will win an award.
- Best Exhibit in both the Summer & Autumn Show will be awarded the N.V.S. Silver Medal at the judge's discretion.

Exhibitors must clear away their entries at the end of the show, including emptying vases and disposing of sand/paper used in displays.

Any matter not provided for in these rules will be referred to the Show Secretary, whose decision is final.

The Autumn Show at Benhill Allotment Site Sunday 1st September, 2024

An award will be presented to the person with the most first prizes in the Autumn Show.

An award will be presented to the exhibitor with the highest number of points in the Flowers Section in the Show.

Chrysanthemum

- 1. 1 vase, 3 chrysanthemum blooms
- 2. 1 chrysanthemum bloom, any classification
- 3. 1 vase containing 3 stems of spray chrysanthemums, 1 or more cultivars
- 4. **Novice Class**: 1 vase, 3 chrysanthemum blooms

Dahlias

- Blooms exceeding the limits will be judged 'not according to schedule'.
- Small: Blooms must not exceed 170mm diameter
- Medium: Blooms must not exceed 220mm diameter
- 5. 3 dahlia blooms, medium decorative
- 6. 3 dahlia blooms, small decorative
- 7. a vase of no more than 12 quality dahlias, any container
- 8. **Novice Class:** 3 dahlia blooms, medium flowered

Fuchsias

9.

6 florets, a minimum of 2 different varieties (container supplied)

Other Flowers

- 10. **1** specimen rose
- 11. **1** vase, 3 stems, any flowering shrub, any variety or varieties.
- 12. 1 vase mixed garden flowers.
- 13. 1 vase, 6 stems, annuals, 1 cultivar only
- 14. 1 vase, 6 stems, perennials, 1 cultivar, excluding Dahlia and Chrysanthemum

An award will be presented to the exhibitor with the highest number of points in the Plants Section

- 15. 1 single flowered fuchsia, pot not to exceed 20cm
- 16. 1 double or semi-double flowered fuchsia, pot not to exceed 20cm

- 17. 1 pot plant, flowering, excluding fuchsia and pelargonium
- 18. 1 pot plant, pelargonium
- 19. 1 pot plant, coleus
- 20. 1 pot plant, foliage, excluding coleus
- 21. 1 cactus or succulent, any container
- 22. 1 pot containing cacti or succulents not exceeding 30cm

Vegetables Judge: Mr A Hills

The NVS Silver Medal will be awarded to the best single dish in the vegetable section, excluding Collections.

An award will be presented to the exhibitor with the most points in the Autumn Show in the vegetable section.

23. The BCHS Premier Tray

This exhibit will be a collection of 3 vegetables from the 8 listed below:

(3) potatoes	(2) cabbages	(3) onions	(6) tomatoes
(6) runner beans	(3) beetroot	(3) parsnips	(3) carrots

- Numbers required in brackets
- All vegetables should be displayed within an area 46cm deep by 60cm frontage
- A black base cloth or board is required for presentation
- The only garnishing material allowed is parsley. No other material, ie plates, sand etc is allowed
- Onion tops, not to exceed 7.5cm may be tied or whipped using raffia
- Judged on NVS rules, with all vegetables allocated points out of 20

Prizes: 1st - £10 BCHS Voucher 2nd - £5 BCHS Voucher. 3rd - £3 BCHS Voucher.

- 24. 9 beans (French), with stalks
- 25. 9 beans (runner), with stalks
- 26. 3 beetroots, round or cylindrical, with at least 7.5cm tops
- 27. 2 cabbages, or savoys, with at least 7.5cm stalks
- 28. **3** carrots with at least 7.5cm tops
- 29. 2 cobs of sweetcorn, with outer leaves peeled back at the top
- 30. 3 courgettes grown between 12cm 20cm in length
- 31. 1 cucumber
- 32. 3 garlic bulbs
- 33. 2 leeks, shown as grown
- 34. 2 marrows, not to exceed 45cm in length
- 35. 5 onions, 1 cultivar, not to exceed 250grms each

- 36. **3** onions, 1 cultivar, over 250grms each
- 37. 2 parsnips, with at least 7.5cm tops
- 38. **3** sweet peppers, with stalks
- 39. 6 chilli peppers, with stalks
- 40. 5 potatoes, white, on a dish
- 41. 5 potatoes, coloured, on a dish (includes coloured eyes)
- 42. 10 tomatoes (cherry), not exceeding 3.5cm diameter, with stalks, on a dish
- 43. 6 tomatoes, with stalks, on a dish
- 44. 6 plum tomatoes, with stalks, on a dish
- 45. 10 shallots on a dish
- 46. 1 squash
- 47. 3 sticks of rhubarb, no leaves, with 7.5cm tops
- 48. any other vegetable not listed above

Fruit	Judge: Mr A Hills

An award will be presented to the exhibitor with the highest number of points in the Fruit Section in the Autumn Show

- 49. **3** dessert apples
- 50. 3 cooking apples
- 51. 3 pears, any variety
- 52. 10 blackberries with stalks on a dish
- 53. any other fruit not mentioned above

Points and prizes awarded in this class will not contribute to any award or medal

- 54. 1 green runner bean, judged by length
- 55. 1 green runner bean, judged by curliness
- 56. 1 onion, judged by weight
- 57. 1 potato, judged by weight
- 58. 1 pumpkin, judged by weight
- 59. 1 truss of tomatoes, judged by weight
- 60. most amusing shaped veg

Domestic

An award will be presented to the exhibitor with the highest number of points in the Domestic Section in the Autumn Show.

Baking

- Sugar should NOT be sprinkled on cookery for decoration
- All exhibits should be displayed on a plate or board (except apple pie)
- Pastry/cake mixes used should be made by the exhibitor
- 'Large' baked items should be between 18cm and 25cm in diameter
- 61. a large Victoria sandwich, jam filled (not dusted with sugar)
- 62. a large fruit cake (not iced)
- 63. 6 chocolate chip muffins
- 64. 6 fruit scones
- 65. 6 Flapjacks
- 66. any other sweet baked item not listed above, presented with a list of ingredients and method
- 67. a large savoury flan, not to exceed 25cm
- 68. a loaf of bread with a list of ingredients made without using a bread machine
- 69. any other savoury baked item not listed above

Preserved Foods

- Clear covers for jars are required
- Metal lids should be removed before judging commences
- Clean jars, labelled appropriately
- 70. jar of soft fruit jam, made in the current year
- 71. jar of stone fruit jam, made in the current year
- 72. jar of any other fruit jam, made in the current year
- 73. jar of marmalade, made in the current year
- 74. jar of jelly, made in the current year
- 75. jar of chutney, made since September 2023
- 76. jar of relish, chili jam, pickle or ketchup, made since Sept 2023
